

GENERAL POLICIES
of the Core Knowledge[®] Foundation
regarding
TRADEMARK LICENSING AND COPYRIGHT PERMISSIONS

1. The name “Core Knowledge” is a registered U.S. trademark protected by federal law for use only by the Core Knowledge Foundation and those licensed to do so by the Foundation. “Core Classic” and “Core Chronicle” are registered U.S. trademarks as well.

2. The Core Knowledge logo, five paper dolls dancing in a circle, either in color or in black and white, is a registered U.S. trademark protected by federal law for use only by the Core Knowledge Foundation and those licensed to do so by the Foundation.

3. Copyright to the books published by the Core Knowledge Foundation, including the *Core Knowledge Sequence*, the *Core Knowledge Preschool Sequence*, and the *Core Knowledge K–8 Monthly Planning Guide*, is owned by the Core Knowledge Foundation. This copyright grants to the Core Knowledge Foundation all reproduction, publication and distribution rights for use of passages from these books in all media of any kind, including print, A/V and electronic, as well as the exclusive right to create modifications, revisions and all other derivative works.

4. Copyright to the books published under license by Doubleday/Dell and edited by E. D. Hirsch, Jr., namely the series from *What Your Kindergartner Needs to Know* through *What Your Sixth Grader Needs to Know* is owned by the Core Knowledge Foundation, which holds all reproduction rights for use of passages from these books, except those passages quoted from and credited to other sources.

5. Copyright to the brochures and newsletters published by the Core Knowledge Foundation is owned by the Core Knowledge Foundation, which holds all reproduction, publication and distribution rights for use of passages and articles from these pieces, as well as the exclusive right to create modifications, revisions and all other derivative works.

THEREFORE,

6. Since the names “Core Knowledge,” “Core Classics,” and “Core Chronicles” are registered trademarks, they may not be used by other individuals, organizations, or businesses without prior negotiation and agreement with the Core Knowledge Foundation;

7. Since the various logos with a circle of dancing paper dolls are registered trademarks, they may not be used by other individuals, organizations, or businesses without prior negotiation and agreement with the Core Knowledge Foundation;

8. And since the books published by the Core Knowledge Foundation or edited by E. D. Hirsch, Jr., are copyrighted material, they or portions of them may not be used by other individuals, organizations, or businesses without prior negotiation and agreement with the Core Knowledge Foundation.

PROCEDURES

1. First, determine whether your interest in associating a product with Core Knowledge represents a request for a trademark license, a request for permissions to reproduce, publish, and/or distribute copyrighted material, or both.

If you are developing a product that aligns in some way with the content of the *Core Knowledge Sequence* or the *Core Knowledge Preschool Sequence*, you should request trademark licensing. The Core Knowledge Foundation considers applications for trademark licensing on a monthly schedule, judging applicants primarily on whether product quality and integrity meet Foundation standards. If the Core Knowledge Foundation deems your request an example of “fair use” or grants a trademark license to you, you will *within limits prescribed in the permission document itself* have the legal right to use the Foundation’s name and, in some cases, its logo on your product(s). Without that prior arrangement, use of the name “Core Knowledge” or the Core Knowledge logos is strictly forbidden.

If you are developing a product that uses wording from the contents of Core Knowledge books, including the subject headings from the *Core Knowledge Sequence*, you should request copyright permission. If permission is granted to you, you will *within limits prescribed in the permission document itself* have the legal right to reproduce the words, phrases, or passages from the books in question and publish and/or distribute your product in the specified medium and market. Without that permission, reproduction of passages from the Core Knowledge books is strictly forbidden.

If you are interested in quoting a passage from the contents of one of the Core Knowledge books in a publication of your own, you should request copyright permission. If permission is granted to you, you will *within provisions outlined in the permission document itself* have the legal right to quote a passage or passages from the books in question, subject to credit to the Foundation. Without that permission, lengthy quotations of this nature (more than 100 words long) are strictly forbidden.

2. Second, depending on your interests, request from the Core Knowledge Foundation either the form, “Request for Trademark Licensing,” or the form, “Request for Copyright Permission,” or both.

3. Complete the appropriate form(s) and send your request(s) together with a nonrefundable processing fee and a formal letter fully describing your request to the Core Knowledge Foundation, Attn: Trademark and Copyright Requests, 801 East High Street, Charlottesville, Virginia 22902. The fee is \$50 for a single request, \$100 if you are requesting both trademark and copyright permissions.

The formal letter must include, as possible:

- a clear and full description of the product or project
- a sample of the product or a representation of the project
- the intended price of the product
- the intended market for the product and estimated market size
- the intended channels of distribution
- clear identification of how and where the Core Knowledge name and/or material will appear on or in your product or project

In a request for copyright permission to quote, please also include the full passage of interest, including an accurate citation of its source.

4. The Core Knowledge Foundation considers requests such as these on a monthly basis. Please be patient as you wait for a response to your formal request. Be sure to include full contact information, so that any questions arising during the review of your request can be answered swiftly.

5. The Core Knowledge Foundation reserves the right to charge a licensing fee for use of its trademarks and/or copyrights. Relevant criteria in setting the fee are extent of use requested, type of product, pricing, scope of marketing/distribution, non-profit status of applicant (if applicable).
